All performances feature internationally distinguished staff collaborating with talented students and emerging musicians.

Be among the first to experience music in the magnificently revitalised Avalon Theatre at St Lucia as The University of Queensland School of Music proudly presents the Spectrum Festival Opening Gala.

This landmark event celebrates not only the musical revival of a cherished performance venue but also showcases the remarkable talents of UQ's distinguished staff and outstanding student musicians.

The program spans Baroque masterpieces to contemporary compositions. As UQ's newest staff member, internationally acclaimed clarinettist and composer Paul Dean will perform the lyrical second movement of Gerald Finzi's Clarinet Concerto, displaying the instrument's expressive depth.

Audiences will also experience Dean's own Covid Lockdown Miniatures for violin and clarinet—a poignant contemporary reflection on resilience through music.

Featured throughout the concert is Pulse Chamber Ensemble, led by virtuoso UQ staff members Doretta Balkizas (violin) and Patrick Murphy (cello). Baroque treasures by Vivaldi, Pergolesi and Handel will complement the newer works on the program.

### Saxophone Sojourns: From Classical to Contemporary

The performance will also feature Shostakovich's exhilarating "Festive Overture" alongside contemporary works including Rob Buckland's rhythmically vibrant "Moiito" and Andy Ball's evocative "Chimera." Adding further colour to this diverse program are Astor Piazzolla's passionate "Libertango," reimagined by Dr Di Marco and Matthew Walton's inventive "Pastiche for Saxophone Ensemble," which playfully fuses multiple musical ideas. 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### Clarinet Cosmos: Patterns in Blue

The University of Queensland School of Music proudly presents a performance by Patterns in Blue – our clarinet ensemble, newly named after John Gilfedder's celebrated clarinet choir masterpiece. We are thrilled to welcome internationally renowned clarinettist, composer and educator Paul Dean to lead the UQ Clarinet Ensemble. With his distinguished career as a soloist, chamber musician and conductor, Dean brings unparalleled expertise and artistic vision to leading this group.

Under his direction, the ensemble will explore a rich tapestry of repertoire that showcases the clarinet's remarkable expressive range and virtuosic capabilities. From classical masterworks to contemporary compositions, including Gilfedder's evocative "Patterns in Blue", audiences can expect performances of outstanding musicality and technical brilliance.

### Flutes in the Wind

Join us for an enchanting afternoon as SignWaves, The University of Queensland's dynamic flute collective. presents "Flutes in the Wind" a captivating journey through the versatile world of flute music. Under the expert direction of Patrick Nolan, this remarkable ensemble will transform the amphitheatre into a resonant chamber of harmonic exploration. Since their formation in 2020, SignWaves has established a reputation for performances of extraordinary character and textural richness across diverse venues including cathedrals, art galleries, atriums and outdoor settings.

This concert showcases an eclectic program spanning intimate solo pieces to majestic full flute choir arrangements, demonstrating the range and expressive capabilities of this beloved instrument. The amphitheatre setting provides the perfect acoustic environment to experience the nuanced tones and ethereal qualities that make flute music so captivating.

### Beats and Beyond: Exploring Percussion

The UQ Percussion Ensemble delivers sonically diverse performances that showcase both collective virtuosity and individual talent. Their repertoire features an array of percussion ensemble works alongside engaging solo compositions.

At the heart of their approach lies complex rhythmic structures, melodic fluency, exceptional ensemble communication, and instrumental power. Student musicians present works spanning a variety of styles and eras, showcasing their skills on diverse instruments.

The ensemble benefits from the expert guidance of David Montgomery, Angus Wilson and Jacob Enoka, with instructors occasionally joining performances, creating valuable opportunities for collaborative music-making that bridges the student-teacher relationship through shared artistic expression. This performance features an exploration of colourful percussion sounds including handheld curiosities and tom toms.

### Fanfares and Flourishes: The St. Lucia Brass

The University of Queensland School of Music proudly presents the St. Lucia Brass in a showcase of exceptional musicianship and captivating repertoire from UQ's premier brass collective.

St. Lucia Brass brings together outstanding musicians from across the university community, creating performances of technical brilliance and expressive depth. Their diverse programming celebrates the rich heritage of brass music while exploring its contemporary possibilities.

Experience the majestic renaissance polyphony of Giovanni Gabrieli alongside the dramatic intensity of Richard Wagner's orchestral masterpieces. The ensemble's performances showcase virtuosic works by Anthony De Lorenzo, the sweeping orchestral textures of Pyotr Tchaikovsky, and the bold, modern energy of Dmitri Shostakovich – all reimagined for the distinctive sonorities of brass instruments.

The program showcases the ensemble's diverse creative approach, featuring premieres that range from Japanese animation and video gameinspired arrangements to animated notation and live film scores. Experience compositions that dialogue with natural environments. offering a unique sonic journey that celebrates both musical tradition and bold experimentation.

# Experience the artistry of the Pulse Chamber Orchestra in the acoustically stunning Atrium of UQ's Global Change Institute.

As The University of Queensland's premier string ensemble, Pulse performs without a conductor, embracing a collaborative approach where each musician contributes to the ensemble's artistic vision under the expert guidance of directors Doretta Balkizas and Patrick Murphy. Pulse's diverse repertoire spans classical masterworks. innovative transcriptions of Bartók's Mikrokosmos, and compositions by Australian composers both past and present. Their boundary-pushing performances have earned them recognition beyond traditional classical circles. Known for their creative collaborations, Pulse has partnered with prestigious organisations including the Choir of Temple Church, performing liturgical works by Bruckner, Rutter, and Britten.

Their groundbreaking 2021 project with Opera Queensland and Urban Art Projects, "Songs of Love and War", reimagined Monteverdi's madrigals alongside contemporary songs by ABBA, Beyoncé, and David Bowie in an immersive foundry setting—a collaboration that led to an invitation to perform at the Festival of Outback Opera. This program showcases the ensemble's versatility, featuring Paul Stanhope's buoyant "Dancing on Clouds" alongside Natalie Williams' evocative "Saudade: Suite for double string quartet" contemporary Australian works that highlight Pulse's commitment to championing local composers. The performance culminates with Tchaikovsky's magnificent Serenade for Strings, a beloved masterpiece that will resonate beautifully in the Atrium's unique acoustic environment.



By developing a broad range of skills, you are equipped with highly transferable abilities, making you well positioned to adapt to a changing professional world.

The **Bachelor of Arts** is a three-year degree that gives you the opportunity to study aspects of music as part of a broader program in the humanities and social sciences. With more than 40 study areas to choose from, you can create a set of skills that is unique to you and your passions.

 The Music major lets you develop knowledge about the many social and historical meanings of music, explore the written and aural complexities of music and approach the study of music in an engaging way.

- The Popular Music minor lets you learn to express yourself through writing and music production and become technically equipped for changing music-making environments.
